

## Hynes winning money race over Quinn; McKenna leads GOP

Incumbent Illinois Gov. Pat Quinn had less than half as much money as his Democratic opponent heading into the final weeks before the primary election, according to campaign finance records.

Dan Hynes ended the six-month reporting period Dec. 31 with \$3.1 million, compared with Quinn's \$1.5 million, the records show,  $largely\ the\ result\ of\ the\ three-term\ state\ comptroller's\ huge\ head\ start\ over\ Quinn,\ who\ stepped\ into\ the\ governor's\ office\ after\ the\ properties of\ the\ propertie$ impeachment of his predecessor last year.

Quinn closed the gap a bit by raising at least \$650,000 in January.

Among seven candidates seeking the Republican nomination for governor Feb. 2., businessman Andy McKenna has far outpaced his rivals, raising \$2.2 million. Records show he collected an additional \$1.7 million in January, although three-quarters of that was in

Candidates for statewide office were required to file with the State Board of Elections this week details on the financing of their campaigns for the last half of 2009.

## \$100,000 from mom

Quinn, the former lieutenant governor who has held the top spot less than a year, showed an incumbent's fundraising power, collecting \$3.1 million during the period to Hynes' \$2.3 million, but Quinn started the six-month stretch with just \$702,000 on hand.

"Quinn historically has been someone who has had a lot of trouble raising money and not a big interest in raising money," political science professor Kent Redfield said. "The difference is largely the head start that Hynes had.

In January, Quinn has collected \$650,000 in big contributions that require immediate reporting, although a third of that is in loans, including \$100,000 from Quinn's mother.

Eileen Quinn dipped into her savings to help her son because she was so angry at Hynes' attacks, which called her son a liar over an early prison release plan, Quinn campaign spokeswoman Elizabeth Austin said.

Hynes picked up \$228,000 in January. He has used his largesse on repeated television ads ripping the incumbent for the early release program. Quinn halted the program, which released 1,700 inmates - some of them violent - weeks early after an Associated Press report revealed its existence in December.

Quinn responded with just one ad until this week, when he aired another questioning Hynes' role as state comptroller to regulate cemeteries in the Burr Oak Cemetery desecration scandal.

Four former workers at the cemetery in Alsip have been arrested on charges they dug up hundreds of graves, double-stacked bodies or dumped remains, and then resold the plots at the historic black cemetery in a moneymaking scheme. Quinn has said Hynes had responsibility as comptroller to oversee the cemetery but didn't discover the scandal.

"We are very happy with where we are," Hynes campaign spokesman Matt McGrath said. "We've raised more than we budgeted for, and we expect that to help us effectively communicate these final weeks, as well as get our vote out."

## McKenna in lead

Republicans trying to regain the Executive Mansion after eight years have been led by McKenna, the former state party chairman.

He spent all but \$63,500 of the \$2.2 million he raised in the last half of 2009. He has taken in at least \$1.7 more in January, although \$1.3 million of that has been loaned by his wife, Mary.

"We expect that he will continue to gain momentum through Election Day," McKenna spokesman Lance Trover said.


State Sen. Kirk Dillard is closest to McKenna, raising \$1.4 million and spending \$1 million, leaving him with \$368,700. He has raised an additional \$139,700 in January.


Former Attorney General Jim Ryan, the 2002 gubernatorial nominee, starting late, collected \$313,400 and spent \$123,200, leaving him with \$190,200. His January intake has been \$229,300.


Redfield said Republican contributions look smaller only because they're spread out over seven candidates.

Businessman Adam Andrzejewski raised \$752,400 and had \$334,400 at the end of December; state Sen. Bill Brady raised \$443,100 and had \$192,000 left; DuPage County Board Chairman Bob Schillerstrom took in \$661,100 and had \$119,900 left; and conservative commentator Dan Proft collected \$169,200 and had \$51,300 on hand.
