UIS senior Environmental Studies major Lucy Perlman traveled to China this past summer with the late Dennis Ruez, associate professor and chair of ENS. Her trip was funded by a Wanxiang grant, the College of Public Affairs and Administration, and the Undergraduate Research Support Program.

According to Lucy, "My experience during the Wanxiang Fellows trip was truly unforgettable. I met so many amazing new people from a culture so different from my own while in China, yet we were still able to become friends. I learned a vast amount about a variety of subjects, from renewable energies to Chinese culture, language and, of course, food! While in China I visited Beijing, Shanghai and Hangzhou, which is where we were stationed for the majority of the program. The money granted by the USR fund provided me with the opportunity to test air quality abroad, and to continue with air quality testing in the U.S., giving me the ability to further my own research in the field. The program was a once in a lifetime experience that I will cherish for years to come, both because of the knowledge I gained academically, and the exposure to a new culture!"

# **UIS Athletics**

The 2019 fall sports season at the University of Illinois Springfield saw great performances, both individually and by teams.



On the soccer pitch, the men's soccer team tied its NCAA-era record for victories, while the women's squad was one short of its program's wins record. The Prairie Stars men made the GLVC Tournament for the third straight season, while the women came up just one goal shy of returning to the conference's postseason play.

Leading the way for the men's squad was Mario Falsone, who was one of the program's top players during its NCAA era. At the end of the regular season, he held school records since UIS moved up to the NCAA level with 19 goals, 12 assists and 50 points. In his senior season, Falsone led the team with six goals and five assists. Falsone also made a difference in the classroom being one of two players named to the CoSIDA Academic All-District team.

The women's soccer team also had a star senior forward in Maggie Juhlin. Juhlin scored nearly half of the team's goals in 2019, and led the GLVC during the

regular season with nine goals and 22 points. She finished her career as one of the program's all-time offensive threats with 17 goals, nine assists and 43 points.

In order to win in collegiate volleyball, teams have to have a dominant offense and defense. In 2019, UIS had two of the best individuals in program history in both categories. Offensively, senior middle blocker Alli Splitt was nearing the 1,500-point plateau toward the end of the season, likely becoming just the second Prairie Star to hit that milestone. Defensively, Jailyn Borum rewrote the school's digs records. The senior defensive star was on pace to surpass 1,800 career digs, passing the previous record of 1,783.

Splitt and Borum have been key parts of the top three UIS teams during its NCAA era over the last three seasons. In that span, UIS won over 60 contests, and last season earned the first GLVC Championship and first NCAA Tournament bid in program history.

The UIS cross country teams both had their best conference results in program history. The men's team finished second in the GLVC, and a record four runners earned all-conference accolades. Wyatt McIntyre was second in the individual standings, the highest finish for a Prairie Stars individual at a GLVC



cross country meet. Blake Jones, Tayler Pasley and Tyler Hiserote all had top-15 finishes which gave them all-GLVC honors.

The women's program finished sixth as a team after a late injury in the race cost the team a third-place showing. Taryn Christy was third overall, which was also the best individual finish on the women's side. Savannah Brannan had a top-10 individual finish as well, earning her an all-GLVC award.

The UIS winter sports season will look to replicate the success of the fall teams. Both the men's and women's basketball teams will be starting new eras with Matt Brock being the new men's head coach, and Casey Thousand taking over the women's squad. The basketball seasons started in early November, with the full conference schedule starting in the new year.

# **Residence Life**

### Hello UIS Parents!

Another fall semester is coming to a close and we are so excited to introduce the new things coming for the spring semester! Your student will be preparing for finals and Winter Break very soon. Students will be given information regarding Winter Break Closing during their floor and court meetings, before the end of the semester. Our residence halls do close during Winter Break (except for students who are unable to travel home). If students plan to stay on campus for any reason during any part of Winter Break, they will need to complete the Winter Break Request Form, available on our website. There is *no charge* for Winter Break housing.



In August 2019, the Student Affairs Division launched the UIS Star Map, an educational curriculum to guide the learning

that UIS students receive outside of the classroom. The Department of Residence Life now offers programs specifically on Tuesday, Thursday and Saturday nights for students. This gives students a set time each week to connect with others and engage in meaningful conversations and activities to help them develop outside of the classroom.

As an additional amenity, beginning in Fall 2020, we will offer **FREE LAUNDRY!** With the new free laundry program, we are hoping students will feel a little more comfortable in their home away from home!

Speaking of feeling at home, the Room Selection Process will begin Saturday, Feb. 1. Students will be able to start renewing their contracts via our online form starting Feb. 1 and will be able to select their space March 26-27.

All Returning Sophomore – Second Year Residential Initiative (SYRI) students will have the opportunity to choose their assignments if they do not request/require specialty housing and apply by



March 6. All returning students who reapply for housing by March 6 will be a part of our <u>SelectRoom</u> <u>Process</u>, which allows students to choose where they wish to live on campus for the 2020-21 academic year. Students who apply by March 8 will be given an access time determined by an automated lottery completed by our Housing Management System by March 19. This access time will allow the student to select their space on March 26-27. If a student does not select a unit during their selection time, they will be automatically assigned after March 30. There will be a limited number of West Campus Townhouse spaces available for selection, in addition to several residence hall spaces.

As we receive more and more freshmen applications over the summer, your sophomore student may get an additional opportunity to be reassigned to a townhouse. There will be a Reassignment Request Form available on June 1 for all Second Year Sophomore - SRYI students to complete indicating their interest in being considered for reassignment to the townhouses. This is only a request, and not a guarantee. As it is a privilege to be moved to the West Campus Townhouses, we require our Second Year Returning Sophomore - SRYI students to meet certain criteria to be considered for reassignment. This information can be found on our FAO Document, which all students are given during the Room Selection Process and is accessible on our website.



If an upperclassman wishes to be a part of a Themed Community such as Family Housing or Graduate Student Housing, or has an ADA

accommodation, they will need to apply by Feb. 17. This is our Specialty Housing application/contract deadline, so we can assign the

student to a specific unit or area to meet their needs or place them in the Themed Community they have selected.



If a student elects a Specialty Housing assignment, they will not be able to select their own pace for the 2020-21 academic year. Our returning students and graduate students have the opportunity to choose their assignment if they do not request/require Specialty Housing and apply by March 6. All returning students who reapply for housing by March 6 will be part of our SelectRoom process, which allows students to choose where they wish to live on campus for the 2020-21 academic year. Students who apply by March 6 will be given an access time for room selection by March 19. This access time will allow the student to select their unit on March 26-27. If a student does not select a unit during their selection time, they will be automatically assigned after March 30.

We will have information tables for students to visit throughout the month of February, to ask questions about their housing application/contract for the 2020-21 academic year. This online application/contract is electronically signed by the student, thus binding them to our Housing Contract Terms and Conditions – same as a lease agreement. If a student decides that they no longer wish to live on campus after applying for the 2020-21 academic year, they will need to submit a Contract Cancellation Request Form by May 15 and be approved to avoid additional cancellation fees. We encourage all students to apply early to reserve a space, but also keep in mind the cancellation deadline and specific criteria for approved housing contract release.



In addition to renewing their contracts, students seeking employment opportunities for the 2020-21 academic year may also find our Resident Assistant (RA) application available online. The RA position gives students the opportunity to be campus leaders, as well as develop lifelong skills for future career opportunities.
