Students complete ECCE requirements in at least 2 of the 3 ECCE Categories-U.S. Communities, Global Awareness, Engagement Experience (per CAP and major requirements)-in addition to Speakers Series- 10 Hours.

Students completing the Liberal Studies major should enroll in LIS 301, Self-Directed Learning, as soon as they decide they want to complete the major. Only two courses, LIS 301 and LIS 451, are required for every LIS major. Other major requirements can be met by a variety of courses for each of the Boyer categories. The coursework in LIS 301 will clarify which of the seven Boyer Category courses [Art, Heritage, Identity, Institutions, Language, Nature, and Work] they will need to complete since they may have already completed some of the requirements. Consult with Andy Egizi, LIS Advisor, prior to enrolling in courses, to see which requirements are lacking. Students should plan on taking at least two of the Boyer category courses each semester—2 in Fall junior year, 2 in Spring junior year, 2 in Fall senior year, leaving one last requirement, if necessary, in their final semester. Their final semester, ideally Spring of their fourth year, LIS majors will take the Senior Seminar, LIS 451, their last required course.
