There are just a few weeks left in this fall 2022 semester. If you have not yet made a plan for getting those projects and papers done, now is the time. Before you know it, this semester will be in the history books.

While you are planning, don't forget to include the great opportunities being offered by the ISS office and Student Activities. There are still a few more in these final weeks that you will not want to miss.

For those of you finishing your programs this semester, be sure that you have checked your immigration documents, including the program end date on your form I-20. Let us know if that needs to be shortened. And, if you are planning to apply for post-completion OPT, you should do that as soon as possible.

For those not yet done, it is important that you, too, check your documents. Some of you may need a program extension or a Change of Level. Others will be planning a trip outside the US during the break and will need a travel signature to re-enter the US. Some may also need a new visa for that purpose.

If the spring will be your final semester, and you do not need a full course load in order to complete your program, you should request the authorization for a Reduced Course Load before the start of the spring term.

Registration for the spring courses will be open in just a few days. You should register as soon as you can to be sure that there is room for you in the courses that you need. Make sure that you register for a full course load (or get the RCL) in order to maintain your F-I status, and remember, you must have at least one oncampus course from the beginning of the semester until the end.



## Gerlinde Coates scholarship


Asung Shin is an international student graduating this semester with a bachelor's degree in Chemistry. Asung is the recipient of the Gerlinde Coates scholarship.

# Interesting Facts about November throughout the years

On November 22, 1963, President John F. Kennedy, known as JFK, was fatally shot while riding along with his wife in a procession of cars. He was rushed to a hospital all too late and was pronounced dead at Ipm that day. Kennedy was the fourth US president to be assassinated, after Abraham Lincoln, James Garfield, and William McKinley.



On November 19, 1978, the largest group suicide in history took place in Jonestown, Guyana. The group who took their lives were instructed so by Reverend Jim Jones, who lead the suicide cult called the "People's Temple". Over 900 of the cult members drank a cyanide-laced drink, with those who refused being forced to consume it.



Thanksgiving is celebrated on the fourth Thursday of November and has been celebrated since 1621. The first Thanksgiving was a feast celebrating the first bountiful harvest of the pilgrims of Plymouth and New England. It is still celebrated in a similar way, with families coming together and sharing plentiful amounts of food traditionally available during Novem-



The beginning of the end of the War of Independence began on November 30, 1782, when a provisional treaty was signed between the newly-formed United States of America and the Kingdom of Great Britain. The final treaty wasn't completed and signed until nearly a year later in Paris on September 3, 1783.
