Executive Summary

The purpose of the Sangamon County Citizen Survey is to establish benchmarks and evaluate changes in residents' assessments of the quality of life in Sangamon County. The first survey was conducted in 2013 and provided local leaders, community organizations, and citizens with insight into issues facing local residents. This year's survey is the second iteration of the survey with an expanded examination of issues surrounding education in the County. The following sections contain an expansive analysis of the data collected by researchers from 576 individuals on a hundred questions across nine topical areas, including: culture and recreation, social well-being, health, education, economy, infrastructure, government and civic participation, environment, and public safety. In this executive summary, we highlight some of the major findings.

The health and personal finances of Sangamon County residents are improving.

When asked about their own personal health and their personal economic situation, Sangamon County residents report a marked increase from 2013 to 2015. The results of the 2015 Sangamon County Citizen survey indicate an increase in the rates of insured residents as well as those who report having a primary care physician. In fact, 96 percent of those surveyed report having health insurance coverage. This is up almost seven percentage points from the 2013 survey. In addition, the percent of Sangamon County residents who report that there have been times in the past 12 months when they did not have enough money to pay for health care or medicines decreased from 21 percent in 2013 to 15 percent in 2015.

Residents also report an increase in their overall health with a fewer number of individuals reporting days of poor physical health, poor mental health, and days in which they were kept from usual activities.

When asked about their own personal finances, Sangamon County residents are slightly less pessimistic. The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey found that 4.7 percent of residents are unemployed and currently seeking employment. Of those who are employed, 17 percent report being underemployed compared to 21 percent in 2013. In addition, residents who report that their personal financial condition is "worse off" than it was 12 months ago has decreased from 21 percent in 2013 to 13 percent in 2015.

Residents report more positive evaluations of local leaders but less positive about the county, in general.

Forty-one percent of Sangamon County residents feel Sangamon County has "strong" leadership. This perception has increased by 10 percentage points from the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey. Fifty-nine percent of Sangamon County residents are confident that local elected leaders can effectively address local problems. This perception has increased seven percentage points from the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey. Despite this, Sangamon County residents rate the county, in general, less positively. The percentage of residents who think Sangamon County is an "excellent" place to live, raise children, work, and retire has decreased while the percentage who rate it is a "poor" place to work, live, and retire has increased.

Executive Summary

Policy support is contingent.

The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey includes several policy questions on a variety of issues. Some of the key findings are listed below.

Citizens are more likely to support an initiative if it uses the term "combine" rather than "consolidate."

Three-fourths of Sangamon County residents support the possibility of creating a citizen advisory board (an independent board of users and citizen/owners) who can focus on the challenges facing City, Water, Light, and Power (CWLP).

Most residents would not support a tax increase (neither property nor sales) to support local infrastructure or alternative transportation in Sangamon County. However, attitudes are mixed towards supporting local schools. When asked if residents would support an increase in property taxes, increase in local sales taxes, or not support any tax increase to support local schools, 22% support an increase in property taxes, 39% support an increase in local sales taxes, and 39% do not support any tax increases. This is consistent with 28 percent who report that the biggest change they would like to see in their local school district is increased funding to schools.

One-fourth of residents think a second source of water (Hunter Lake) is a "high priority." An additional 41% believe it is a "medium priority."

Education is still a priority.

Pre-K programs, K-12, and post-secondary education are high priorities for Sangamon County residents. The survey indicates that a higher percentage of Sangamon County residents believe that programs for children three to five years old are "very important" compared to programs for children ages two and younger, yet a majority of respondents report that both types of programs are either "very important" or "somewhat important." Overall, parents give their child's school positive ratings. Eighty-one percent of parents believe that their child is receiving an "excellent" or "good" education and 99 percent think that their child is either "very safe" or "somewhat safe" at school. The majority, 96 percent, of residents report that post-high school institutions are important to the region. In addition, 90 percent report that it is either "very important" (55 percent) or "somewhat important" (35 percent) for an individual to have a college degree. The expanded education section discusses all aspects of education in detail.

Methodology

The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey includes 576 completed telephone interviews (32% completed by landline numbers and 68% completed by cell phones) of Sangamon County residents. The survey is representative of Sangamon County, Illinois and the data was weighted for probability sampling and to match the most recent population estimates as provided by the U.S. Census Bureau. The overall response rate for the survey is 13.2%, the cooperation rate is 23.2%, and the margin of error is +/- 4.08 percentage points. The 2013 survey found wide support for Pre-K education programs. This trend continues in the most recent survey and provides better context by examining attitudes specifically towards programs for children ages two and younger, programs for children ages three to five, and equal access for low income families. The survey indicates that a higher percentage of Sangamon County residents believe that programs for children three to five years old are "very important" compared to programs for children ages two and younger, yet a majority of respondents report that both types of programs are either "very important" or "somewhat important." When asked how important, if at all, it is for children from all income levels to have access to the services, 92 percent of survey respondents report that it is important. On all three items, African-Americans report a higher level of support than white respondents (see figure).



KEY FINDINGS:

- ✓ While Sangamon County residents believe that pre-K programs are important for all age groups and support equal access for less advantaged families, there is mixed support for what public or private organization, if any, should be providing less advantaged families with access to pre-K programs. Thirty eight percent of individuals believe it is the "entire community's responsibility," 32 percent believe it is the responsibility of the individual families, and 21 percent believe it is the responsibility of the local school district.
- Of the roughly 8,000 Sangamon County children ages three to five, an estimated 2,000 (25 percent) are less advantaged.¹ Existing programs, including Early Start, which is Springfield Public School District's Preschool for All program, and the eight Head Start sites in the county, appear to reach about two-thirds of this population.

pre-K programs

K-12 programs

KEY FINDINGS:

- The biggest change that Sangamon County residents would like to see in their local school district is increased funding to schools (28 percent). This is consistent with the 2013 survey findings (25 percent). In 2013, 12 percent reported that their local school district needed improved leadership/administration; in 2015, this decreases to seven percent. The second most reported needed change in 2015 is smaller class sizes (11 percent).
- Eighty-one percent of parents believe that their child is receiving an "excellent" or "good" education and 99 percent think that their child is either "very safe" or "somewhat safe" at school. This does not differ among public school respondents but is slightly higher among parents' whose children attend private schools.

School Districts¹

While evaluations of the quality of education that children receive at Rochester and Springfield schools did not change, Ball Chatham parents' ratings of their child's education declined slightly, yet the differences are not statistically significant. The table below provides comparison data and includes average teacher salary, high school four-year graduation rates, and the percentage of students who are low income from the Illinois State Board of Education, 2013-2014 data.² It is important to note that Springfield is a much larger school district (more than three times as large as the next largest school district) and serves a larger low income student population.

Post-secondary

Education



KEY FINDINGS:

- Ninety-four percent of Sangamon County adults who have a child between the ages of 5 and 18 report that they plan on their child pursuing education after high school.
- ✓ Fifty percent of parents plan on their child receiving an academic scholarship to cover the cost of their child's education after high school. In addition, 43 percent report that they will pay for these educational pursuits using personal savings, 39 percent report that they will rely on federal loans, and 25 percent report they plan on their child receiving an athletic scholarship (see figure).

94% of parents plan on their child pursuing educational opportunities after graduating high school.

100% of parents who earned a college degree plan on their child pursuing a similar experience, compared to 81% of individuals with a high school diploma or GED.

Post-secondary

KEY FINDINGS:

- Thirty-two percent of Sangamon County residents have a bachelor's degree or advanced degree. Almost half (44 percent) of these individuals received this degree from a local college or university.
- Almost all (96 percent) of Sangamon County residents report that post-high school institutions are important to the region. Ninety percent report that it is either "very important" (55 percent) or "somewhat important" (35 percent) for an individual to have a college degree. These numbers are identical to the 2013 findings.
- Almost half of college graduates living in Sangamon County used public or private student loans to pay for their college education. Individuals without a college degree (individuals who attended trade school or some college) borrowed on average, \$13,300. College graduates, those who completed a four-year college degree, borrowed, on average, \$26,589. Individuals who have an advanced degree borrowed, on average, \$38,837 (see figure below).
- Younger adults report borrowing at a higher rate; individuals between the ages of 18 and 24 years old report that they borrowed, on average, \$37,816.



Sangamon County citizens borrow \$25,440 to attend postsecondary institutions.

Americans, in general, borrow \$28,400 to attend postsecondary institutions.¹

Illinois residents borrow \$28,543 to attend postsecondary institutions.

education policy

The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey included several questions examining education policy including support for charter schools, school vouchers, and bullying prevention. We examine levels of support among public school parents, private school parents, and Sangamon County residents who did not have a child between the ages of five and 18.



KEY FINDINGS:

- Eighty-nine percent of individuals believe that bullying prevention (including physical and cyber-bullying) should be part of school curriculum. This is higher than the national average of 78 percent of national survey respondents in the 2012 PDK/Gallup poll who support such an initiative.¹
- While 63 percent of respondents in the 2015 Citizen Survey favor the idea of charter schools, only 26 percent favor allowing students and parents to choose a private school to attend at the public's expense. Nationally, 37 percent of the population favors this type of policy (as reported in the 2014 PDK/Gallup poll²). As you can see in the figure, Sangamon County residents are slightly less supportive of this type of initiative with 26 percent reporting that they "favor" this education policy, 67 report that they "oppose," and seven percent report that they either "don't know" or refused to answer the question.
- African-American residents are more likely to favor both the idea of charter schools as well as charter school vouchers. Forty-one percent of African-American residents favor charter school vouchers compared to 24 percent of white residents.
- Private school parents are significantly more likely to support charter school vouchers than public school parents. Sixty-three percent of private school parents favor vouchers compared to 20 percent of public school parents.

Economy

KEY FINDINGS:

- The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey finds residents slightly less pessimistic about personal and county economic conditions.
- The unemployment rate for Sangamon County in April 2015, according to the U.S. Department of Labor's Bureau of Labor Statistics is 4.3 percent. The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey found that 4.7 percent of residents are unemployed and currently seeking employment.
- In 2013, 21 percent of employed residents reported that they were underemployed in their current position. The 2015 survey finds that the percent of employed residents who report that they are currently underemployed has decreased to 17 percent.
- The percent of Sangamon County residents who report that their personal financial condition is "worse off" than it was 12 months ago has decreased from 21 percent in 2013 to 13 percent in 2015. The percent of Sangamon County residents who believe that local business conditions are "worse off" than they were 12 months ago has decreased from 30 percent in 2013 to 19 percent in 2015. Despite this, the survey does not find an increase in the percent of Sangamon County residents who think their personal financial and local business conditions are "better off." Those numbers remain static from 2013 to 2015.
- Personal economic conditions differ drastically by demographic group (see table on next page).

Health

The Affordable Care Act (ACA) has changed the system of health care in the United States with the requirement that all Americans have health insurance, as well as the provision that no one can be denied due to pre-existing conditions.¹ And while Sangamon County ranks first among all the 102 Illinois counties in terms of access to care² (2015 County Health Rankings and Roadmaps), having access to care has not always translated to people being able to receive health care.

The results of the 2015 Sangamon County Citizen survey indicate an increase in the rates of insured residents as well as those who report having a primary care physician. Eighty-nine percent of residents now report having a primary health care provider (PCP). This is up three percentage points from the 2013 survey. But maybe even more significant, 96 percent of those surveyed report having health insurance coverage. This is up almost seven percentage points from the 2013 survey.

In addition, the percent of Sangamon County residents who report that there have been times in the past 12 months when they did not have enough money to pay for health care or medicines decreased from 21 percent in 2013 to 15 percent in 2015.

KEY FINDINGS:

- ✓ Sangamon County residents report improvements in their overall health status.
- Eighty-nine percent of residents have a primary health care provider.
- ✓ Ninety-six percent of those interviewed for the 2015 Sangamon County Citizen's survey report currently having health insurance. The 2013 Sangamon County Citizen's survey results found 91 percent of those interviewed were covered by insurance.
- Sangamon County residents report being physically active. Eighty-five percent report engaging in physical activity in the past 30 days.
- ✓ Of all the males who took the survey, 35 percent report that they've had at least one poor physical health day in the last 30 days; for females the rate was 46 percent. The difference was similar when asked about mental health in the last 30 days, with 11 percent of the males reporting to having had one bad day. This compares to 19 percent for females.



When asked about their health in the past 30 days, 40 percent report there was at least one day in which their physical health was not good, 15 percent report at least one day in which their mental health was not good, and 29 percent report there had been at least one day in which they had been kept from usual activities due to health problems. When comparing these rates to the most recent statewide data,¹ we find that the percentage of Sangamon County residents report better health statuses than statewide rates as well as the 2013 survey (see figure above). The percent who report that their physical health was not good on at least one day is nearly even with the state rate of 40 percent, and is also less than 53 percent in 2013. The percent who report at least one day with poor mental health is significantly lower than the state rate of 38 percent as well as 18 percent in 2013. Additionally, the percent that report at least one day in which they had been kept from usual activities due to health is lower than the state rate of 41 percent as well as 39 percent in 2013.

Culture & Recreation

While the majority of the 2015 survey respondents report high levels of satisfaction with local recreational and cultural events in Sangamon County, they are slightly less satisfied than the 2013 survey respondents. Sixty-one percent of 2015 survey respondents report being "very" or "somewhat satisfied" compared to 68 percent of 2013 respondents. Only 15 percent of 2015 respondents report being "dissatisfied" or "very dissatisfied" with local recreational and cultural events.



Satisfaction with events varies across demographic groups. For instance, while 64 percent of white respondents report being "very" or "somewhat satisfied" with access to local events, only 43 percent of nonwhite respondents report the same level of satisfaction. Additionally, individuals not born in Sangamon County (57 percent "very" or "somewhat satisfied") were more positive about access to events than those who were born in the county (54 percent "very" or "somewhat satisfied.")

KEY FINDINGS:

- Respondents born in Sangamon County were less positive about access to local cultural and recreational events than those who were not born in the county.
- Nonwhite respondents report lower levels of satisfaction with access to cultural and recreational events than white respondents.
- Parks are rated highly by all demographic groups.
- An increasing number of Sangamon County residents report that they do not have access to a local library; seven percent of 2013 survey respondents reported not having access compared to 11 percent of 2015 survey respondents.

While there are considerable differences across demographic groups in terms of evaluating access to local cultural and recreational events, all respondents were extremely positive about their local parks. Nearly three-fourths of respondents rate their local park as either "excellent" or "good," including 73 percent of nonwhite respondents and 76 percent of white respondents. Interestingly, Springfield residents and those living outside of the city rate their parks equally positively, with 73 and 75 percent rating their local park as "excellent" or "good," respectively. These results are consistent with the 2013 survey in which respondents also reported positive attitudes towards their local parks.

Evaluations of local libraries are slightly less positive in the 2015 survey than the 2013 survey results, with an increasing number of individuals reporting that they do not have access to a local library. In 2013, seven percent of all Sangamon County residents reported that they did not have access to a local library; of those who had access, 65 percent rated it positively. In 2015, 60 percent rate their local library positively and 11 percent report that they do not have a local library.

Environment

KEY FINDINGS:

- Thirty-one percent of Sangamon County residents report that litter/improper trash disposal is a "big problem" in Sangamon County. This is four percentage points higher than the 2013 survey results.
- Sangamon County residents living in zip code 62703 are more likely to report that litter/improper trash disposal is a problem than residents living in any other zip code. Residents living in the metro area are more likely than non-metro residents to report that litter is a problem.¹
- Sixty-eight percent of Sangamon County residents report recycling in their homes. This is slightly higher than the 66 percent who reported recycling in 2013 but still significantly less than the national average of 77 percent.²
- Married individuals or individuals in a domestic partnership or civil union report recycling at a higher rate than single respondents, 73 percent versus 60. This difference is likely attributable to differences in income and homeownership.

Respondents judge litter to be a problem in Sangamon County though not necessarily in their own neighborhoods. Seventy-nine percent of respondents say that litter/improper trash disposal is either a "big" or "small problem" in Sangamon County. This compares to 58 percent of respondents who say litter is a problem in their local community and 35 percent who report it is a problem on their street.

Sangamon County metro residents are more likely to report that improper trash disposal is a problem on their street. Onefourth of respondents living outside of the metro area report trash and improper litter disposal as a "big problem," while almost half (45 percent) of metro residents report the same. Residents living in 62703 zip code have the highest percent who report that litter is a problem with 49 percent reporting that it is a "big" problem in Sangamon County, 34 percent reporting that it is a "big" problem in their local community, and 30 percent reporting it is a "big" problem on their street.



For years, Sangamon County residents have heard about efforts to consolidate local waste management services. The 2015 survey tried to dissect these attitudes by asking it in two different ways (using either "combine" or "consolidate"). It appears that question wording matters, with 33% of residents supporting consolidation and 43% of residents supporting combining local waste management services.

Environment

One of the major findings of the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey was that 31 percent of residents reported that they did not have access to a community garden and they needed access. In addition, individuals with lower incomes were more likely to report who report that they do not currently have that they needed access to a community garden. At that time, there were 10 community gardens located in Sangamon County.

In 2015, there are 21 community gardens located in Sangamon County with all of them situated within the Springfield metro area. With this increased access, the 2015 survey finds a slightly lower percentage of individuals access and they need access (26 percent). Yet, access to community gardens among low income residents has not improved (as seen in the figure below).

Infrastructure

Respondents to the 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey believe that Sangamon County is in need of improvement across several areas including implementation of bike friendly lanes on roads, improving bike and pedestrian trails, and expanding highspeed internet access. A smaller percentage of respondents see improving local bus services as a priority (see figure)

A higher percentage of residents living in the metro area report needing bike friendly lanes and improvement of bike and pedestrian trails. Nearly half (48 percent) of metro residents say that their local area needs bike friendly lanes on local roads "a lot," compared to 35 percent of non-metro residents. Metro residents are also more likely (41 percent) than those living outside of the city (32 percent) to say that improvement of bike and pedestrian trails is needed "a lot."

Residents were less likely to report that their local area needs improvements to local bus services with one-third of residents reporting that this is needed "a lot." However, it is important to note that bus ridership, particularly as a regular form of commuting to work is quite low in Sangamon County (and nationally). According to 2013 American Community Survey, 1.3 percent of workers in Sangamon County use public transportation to commute to work.¹ The national average for this figure is 5 percent.



In fact, only five percent of respondents to the 2015 survey indicate they use the Springfield Mass Transit District (SMTD) at least once or twice a week and 85 percent report "never" using the system. African-American residents are more likely than White residents to report that the local bus service improvements are needed "a lot," 54 percent compared to 25 percent.

The 2015 survey finds that 2 percent of Sangamon County residents report using a bicycle to commute to work. This is higher than the 0.6 percent of respondents reported using a bicycle to get to work in 2013 according to the Census. This places Springfield 112th out of 184 mid-sized cities in America in terms of bicycle commuting.

Government & Civic Participation

The perception of local leadership in Sangamon County shows some variation from the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey. In 2015, respondents are more likely to report confidence in local leaders and local elected leaders compared to 2013. Additionally, respondents are 10 percentage points more likely to indicate Sangamon County has strong leaders compared to 2013. The chart to the right illustrates changes in the perception of leadership.



KEY FINDINGS:

- Forty-one percent of Sangamon County residents feel Sangamon County has "strong" leadership. This perception has increased by 10 percentage points from the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey.
- ✓ Fifty-nine percent of Sangamon County residents are confident that local elected leaders can effectively address local problems. This perception has increased seven percentage points from the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey.
- ✓ The youngest respondents, ages 18-24, generally have positive perceptions of local leadership. Seventy-four percent of the youngest respondents make the evaluation Sangamon County has "strong" leaders. Eighty-two percent of the youngest respondents report confidence in local elected leaders and 71 percent report confidence in the ability of local leaders to address local problems. In comparison, respondents ages 35-44 are less optimistic about local leadership. Fifty-six percent of these respondents report confidence in local leaders and local elected leaders. Furthermore, only 38 percent of these respondents make the evaluation Sangamon County has "strong" leaders.
- African-American respondents (50 percent) are more likely than white respondents (39 percent) to indicate Sangamon County has "strong" leaders.
- Only 35 percent of individuals without a high school diploma express confidence in the ability of local elected leaders to effectively address local problems. Conversely, 69 percent of respondents with a four-year college degree indicate having confidence in local elected leaders.

Government & Civic Participation

Many Sangamon County residents indicate they volunteer or engage in other forms of civic participation in the community. Four measures of civic engagement in Sangamon County are represented in the graph below. The 2015 survey finds an increase in the percent of individuals who express opinions online and a decrease in the percent who have donated money to charitable or religious organizations. Monetary donations to charitable organizations have been down since the economic downturn in 2008 but recent reports by the Giving USA Foundation indicate that it is beginning to recover with donation rates now consistent with prerecession levels.¹ It is unclear why the most recent Sangamon County Citizen Survey finds a decrease in charitable giving among residents.

Forty-nine percent of Sangamon county residents indicate they have volunteered through or for a charitable or religious organization within the last 12 months. The percent of respondents who report having volunteered in Sangamon County in the last 12 months is significantly higher than reported state (26 percent)² volunteer rates, but on par with national (49 percent)³ volunteer rates. Younger Sangamon County residents (18-24 year olds) are more likely to express their opinion online (44%) and more likely to volunteer for a charitable organization (52%).

It is important to note that in self-report measures like surveys, people tend to overreport their civic participation. However, we would not expect changes in self-reporting to be dependent on the year.

Government & Civic Participation

KEY FINDINGS:

- ✓ Attitudes on whether Sangamon County residents believe everyone in their community is treated equally are strongly correlated to demographic and minority status. LGBT individuals, individuals with a disability, women, and individuals earning less annual income are less likely to report that they think everyone in the community is treated equally. Interestingly, African-American respondents (54 percent) are equally as likely to report that everyone in their community is not treated equally as white respondents (54 percent).
- ✓ Forty-six percent of residents believe that it is the entire community's responsibility to take care of the most disadvantaged citizens compared to 25 percent who believe it is the individuals' own responsibility and 15 percent who believe it is the responsibility of local government.

56% of respondents do not think everyone in their community is treated equally.

46% think it is the entire community's responsibility to take care of the most disadvantaged population.

When asked "Do you think everyone in your community is treated equally, in other words, does everyone get a fair shake?" 42 percent of respondents indicate they did believe everyone in their community was treated equally. Fifty-six percent of respondents indicate they do not think everyone in their community is treated equally. These results differ slightly than the 2013 survey with a higher percentage of residents reporting that they believe everyone in their community is treated equally, 42 percent compared to 37 percent.

Public Safety

KEY FINDINGS:

- Eighty percent of Sangamon County residents report that they feel safe walking alone at night in their neighborhood compared to 17 percent reporting that they feel unsafe. These results are consistent with the 2013 survey and do not indicate a significant change in perceptions of public safety among Sangamon County residents.
- ✓ Seven percent of residents feel less safe in their home now than they did a year ago.
- Perceptions of law enforcement presence have decreased slightly with only 22 percent of respondents reporting that they see police or other types of law enforcement patrolling their neighborhood (or street) "very often," compared to 31 percent in 2013.
- ✓ African-American residents report a higher law enforcement presence in their neighborhoods and also report feeling "safe" while walking alone at night in their neighborhoods at a higher rate than white residents. However, they are more likely to report that they feel "less safe" in their homes now compared to a year ago.
- One-fourth of female Sangamon County residents report feeling "unsafe" walking alone at night in their neighborhood or on their street.

Social Well-Being

Sangamon County residents rate the county less positively in the 2015 survey compared to the 2013 Sangamon County Citizen Survey. The percentage of residents who think Sangamon County is an "excellent" place to live, raise children, work, and retire has decreased while the percentage who rate it is a "poor" place to work, live, and retire has increased (see figure below).

In addition, when asked if things in Sangamon County are generally on the right track or do you think things are going in the wrong direction, the 2015 survey has a fewer percentage of individuals who report that things are on the right track, a decrease from 60% in 2013 to 53% in 2015. However, there is also a decrease in the percent of individuals who report that things are headed in the wrong direction. In 2013, 31 percent of Sangamon County residents reported that things were headed in the wrong direction. In 2015, this decreases to 28% (with more individuals reporting that they "did not know" or were "unsure.") This results in a net favorable/unfavorable change from +29 in 2013 to +25 in 2015, which indicates that overall ratings in 2015 are still favorable yet not as favorable as they were in 2013.

When asked about their immediate area as a place to live, 16% report that it is getting better, 16% report that it is getting worse, and 66% report that it is staying the same. These results are consistent with the 2013 survey. Interestingly, in the 2015 survey, there are no significant differences among demographic groups which were present in the 2013 survey.



Social Well-Being

KEY FINDINGS:

- ✓ Based on recent current events, the 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey asked residents their attitudes towards race relations in the area. Overall, 64% of residents report that race relations are either "very good" (6%) or "fairly good" (58%). This is considerably higher than a national poll¹ which found that only 39% of U.S. residents reporting that race relations are "generally good."
- ✓ The largest percentage of respondents to report race relations as very good are between the ages 55-64 (29.4%) while younger respondents (25-34 year olds) are more likely to report race relations as "very bad" (40%).
- Sixty-five percent of white respondents report that race relations are good compared to 60% of African-American respondents.

Methodological Report

Transparency Initiative Methodological Report

The 2015 Sangamon County Citizen Survey is sponsored by the Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln, United Way of Central Illinois, and the University of Illinois Springfield's Center for State Policy and Leadership. It was conducted by researchers at the University of Illinois Springfield's Survey Research Office. A steering committee assisted with questionnaire development (comprised of University and Chamber representatives). The topline report includes actual question wording and frequencies for each answer category as well as all open-ended responses.

Sample and Methodology

The survey is representative of Sangamon County, Illinois and the data was weighted for probability sampling and to match the most recent population estimates as provided by the U.S. Census Bureau. The results include 576 completed telephone interviews (32% completed by landline numbers and 68% completed by cell phones) of Sangamon County residents. The overall response rate for the survey is 13.2%, the cooperation rate is 23.2%, and the margin of error is +/- 4.08 percentage points. Telephone interviews began on April 15, 2015 and concluded on May 18, 2015. Interviews were conducted between the hours of 9am and 9pm, Monday through Friday, and 1-5pm on Sunday. All respondents were contacted at least once with the average number of attempted phone calls of 4.. The maximum number of attempts for a respondent is 10 attempts.

She asked the mayor if she could do community service or something someone would not do to pay for her bill but he said no. It was a struggle; she camped out for a year. Nobody in the community helped her and everybody knew it. She was in dire needs. There should be something and people should step up and ask what we can do. It turned her whole opinion of the community. She also lived without utilities for two months. She lived by her fireplace because she had no heat, lights, water or anything. There was nobody to lend her hand. After she inquired, someone steered her to a church organization that paid her utility bills and got them turned back on. If someone is in these situation, unless you have a family who can help you, you're on your own. That's really sad. She pays over \$2,000 in property tax for a, 1,200 square foot house and her neighbor pays \$300 for a two-story home with huge garage and apartment. In 2011, she was hospitalized and while in the hospital her house caught on fire. It was a total mess and is still pretty much like that because she's disabled and can't lift heavy things and can't do anything. You would think the neighbors or someone would come over and help her. Her neighbors have complained about her house being an eyesore and the police have told her if she doesn't get it cleaned up within a certain amount of days, we'll fine you. The community hasn't helped her but want to fine her \$1,000 if she doesn't get it cleaned up. It has turned her against this community. She used to love living her. If you need help, you're SOL. The community doesn't exist her and that's why she moved here in the first place and it disappoints her and she's ready to move because of it. The people are not friendly, the business people are very unfriendly; it's just not what it's supposed to be - a tight-knit, solid community with a foundation of help your neighbor. Nobody's concerned about that; they're concerned about their own self.

I do agree there is a workable solution and that's when the weight is put on everybody to make it a better place. Do unto others as they do unto you. What happens to my neighbor affects me; what happens to anybody in the community affects me. Understanding that and knowing that, try not to think only of yourself but others. Strong education can help people qualify for jobs and people can qualify for jobs in the community. Early childhood education makes a difference to the community. It's very important and if we give them what they need they will grow up and become good leaders in this community. We need to give them the best tools we have available to offer.
