The CAST (Child Advocacy Studies) minor is a collaborative approach to training and educating front line professionals, mandated reporters and the next generation of child welfare practitioners. The CAST curriculum includes core courses aimed at increasing knowledge of key child maltreatment concepts. The program adheres to the standards developed for universities, and the faculty have years of experience in the child welfare field as practitioners and trainers. UIS' CAST minor is the second program in the United States to achieve approval from the Zero Abuse Project.

ZERO ABUSE PROJECT CERTIFIED

The core UIS CAST courses are certified by the ZERO Abuse Project. UIS CAST students are eligible for a certificate as proof of their knowledge, skills and abilities in child maltreatment prevention and intervention. Upon completion of the coursework, students are eligible to receive credit for both the UIS minor as well as the external certification.

SIMULATION LABS

A key feature of experiential learning is the ability to construct environments that are as realistic as one would find working in the field. The Residential Simulation Labs on the UIS Campus, which include a simulated training house and a mock courtroom, are utilized by DCFS, UIS students and other frontline professionals to provide a safe learning environment that:

- Allows trainees to practice their knowledge and skills in a supportive and safe environment where mistakes are allowed and can be corrected.
- Helps to increase confidence and competency, which increases job retention.

WORKFORCE DEVELOPMENT

The UIS Child Protection Training Academy provides simulation training for frontline child protection professionals, including child advocacy center teams and DCFS, juvenile justice and school personnel. Researchers note four advantages for incorporating experiential learning in child welfare training:

- Allows students to explore ways that theories and research inform practice.
- Helps students develop skills in using their theoretical classroom knowledge in practice settings, hopefully enhancing their confidence and competence.
- Enables students to consider the ways that their personal and professional values and beliefs influence judgments.
- Increases students' ability to manage within changing landscapes by developing their skills as reflective practitioners.
