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Commented [CSL1]: MLA style does not ask for a title page. Instead, on the first page of your paper you should list, at the top left, double-spaced, on separate lines, the following information:

Your Name

First name Last name

Professor's Name

Could be last name, could be Dr. Bronston, could be Professor Xavier – up to you and/or if your professor suggests any guidelines

Class Call Number

At UIS, typically it's three letters representing the department, and three numbers representing the class (ENG 101, PAD 510, CCJ 352)

Date

In MLA, format all dates with the day first, in numeric form; then the month, abbreviated with a period; then the year, fully spelled out in numeric form.

Commented [CSL2]: The title goes on the next line following the date, with continued double-spacing. It should be center-aligned and in Title Case (wherein the first word of the title, the first word of the subtitle, and any “important” or significant words – not articles, prepositions, or conjunctions – are capitalized).

Commented [CSL3]: First line indents should be used for all paragraphs of text in your paragraph (with the exception of block quotes, covered below).

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Commented [CSL4]: Your last name and the page number are located in the header of the paper on every page, including the first. Please find a recorded walkthrough of how to format it properly here: [Formatting a Paper in MLA Style](#).

Commented [CSL5]: Block quotes are any direct quote from a source that are 40 words or longer in length. To format them in APA style, follow these guidelines:

- Always offer a running acknowledgement to help it “gel” with the previous sentence – typically an “According to Author (Year),” will suffice.
- Place the quote in the paper and indent the entire thing $\frac{1}{2}$ inch (to match the first-line indent of your paragraphs).
- The period goes before the parenthetical in block quotes.
- The parenthetical should only include information you didn’t already provide. Because we already gave a running acknowledgement with the author and the year above, we only need the page number here.
- Lastly, you should never end a paragraph on a block quote, so you should always continue the paragraph with some explanation and offer closure before moving on to the next point. Thus, the next line after your block quote should be flush with the left margin, as you see here.

Commented [CSL6]: Your Works Cited page should always start on a new page. The word "Works Cited" should appear on the first line of the page, centered, but with no other special formatting (I.e. no bold, italics, underlining, or other). If you only have one source, by the way, you should use "Work Cited" instead.

Commented [CSL7]: Citations are listed in alphabetical order by whatever comes first in each citation (for any that start with A, An, or The, list by the first *relevant* word).

Commented [CSL8]: Citations should have a hanging indent, meaning that the first line should be flush with the left margin, and any subsequent lines should be indented half an inch.
